"Shine On"

Matthew 5:46-47:

¹⁴ 'You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. ¹⁵No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house.

Back in high school, I had an eccentric US History teacher who insisted that history books were overrated. Don't be alarmed. The lesson plan and daily homework still made use of textbooks from a reputable publisher. However, to supplement the curriculum, my fellow classmates and I were required to interview senior citizens who had directly experienced the events taught in the course.

As such, I was forced to find someone that not only remembered the Great Depression but was willing to talk about it for a project. Although I was tempted to simply make up an interview with a fictional person of interest (I know, I'm bad), I ultimately decided to be honest out of fear my teacher would find out. So, I spent a Saturday morning at the Older Person's Commission in Rochester.

After speaking with a woman at the front desk who was sure to let me know I should have called beforehand, 3 or 4 adults gathered around a table for the assignment. Initially, each person's story was unique and unrelated as they emphasized the particulars of their hometowns and families of origin. Eventually though, the bulk of the attention began to shift toward one common topic: parents. Everyone spoke with pride and appreciation for the way their parents lived and handled themselves during such a crisis. "I don't know if I could do what they did," one said.

I mention this 10th grade US History assignment, because I wonder what our loved ones or our little ones would say about the way we handled the Pandemic of the early 2020's. My daughters are likely too young to have any significant memories regarding this chapter, but if they could speak upon what they witnessed from me and the church I serve, what would they say? Would they speak with pride and appreciation?

There's a nonprofit here in Commerce that specifically ensures local students have enough food to eat. Normally, at the end of the school week, these students would take a bag of groceries on the bus ride home for the weekend. Unfortunately, due to virtual learning, the nutritious groceries that would otherwise be sent with them must now be delivered to each individual residence. Volunteers have routinely been in short supply. For the last few weeks of 2020, our church members stepped in and stepped up to meet the need. On Friday December 18th, when the organization had to supply 3 weeks of groceries for winter break and the need for volunteers doubled, our church members stepped in and stepped up again.

Sometime during this new year, we will toss the Pandemic to the curb like the unwanted guest it is. A day is coming when we will sing, dance, and host 100 consecutive potlucks to make up for lost time. And in that glorious future, we might occasionally reflect upon the bizarre and unpleasant nature of the past chapter. As we do, I hope and pray that we, and those who look up to us, will be proud of the people we chose to be.

Through every season, may the light of Christ shine in and through you. Amen. Pastor Andy
